Legislative Update 2025

June 3rd was the end of the 2025 legislative session in Connecticut. The Legislature passed many bills, some of which have been signed by Governor Lamont and some of which are still being considered by the Governor.

The Legislature passed several items that CAFAF has been closely watching. They are:


- The 2 year budget for fiscal years 2025-2026 and 2026-2027. The budget includes an increase for community non-profits, like CAFAF, that serves people in Connecticut in many kinds of ways. Many of these services, if not for community nonprofits, would never be delivered to those that need them or would be provided at a much higher cost by government employees.
- · Passed H.B. 7043: An Act Concerning Foster Care Maintenance Payments. We are delighted to report that Governor Lamont signed this bill into law. The bill requires that foster care reimbursement rates be studied, including comparing the rates to neighboring jurisdictions and the feasibility and recommendations to the Legislature of increasing the rates. CAFAF will report back any information that CAFAF learns about this study. However, all foster parents are encouraged to contact your elected officials and ask how you can participate.
- Passed S.B. 1311: An Act Concerning the Recommendations of the Department of Children and Families. At press time, this bill has yet to be signed into law by Governor Lamont. However, this bill was offered and authored by DCF staff and makes 6 recommendations about improving 6 areas of current state statues. Those areas include: background checks for adults if an emergency removal of children is needed; improving the way older children who left DCF care can seek to return to state care if they request to return; improved cooperation with the Department of Developmental Disabilities; changing the definition of a "child care facility" in very limited circumstances; requirement of DCF to create a foster parent bill of rights to change current DCF policy; and make improvements to the Interstate Compact when children are moving across state lines while under the legal guardianship of DCF. Two footnotes here: CT already has a foster parent "Bill of Privileges" which was written and backed by CAFAF in 2016, and was known originally a "Bill of Rights" and came from DCF policy. The other is that almost all states across the country are working jointly to improve the Interstate Compact. This involves states changing their own state laws to improve nationally how states work together to make it easier and safer for children to go out of state to loved ones, if they cannot stay safely at home.
- · S.B. 1350: An Act Concerning Equitable Compensation for State-Contracted NonProfit Human Service Providers. This bill would require the state to index nonprofit funding in the state budget to inflation annually. The Governor has not yet signed this bill as we "go to press."



Overall, the event was a success, and we look forward to the opportunity to participate again in the near future.



A Journey of Love and Resilience: Emilio Vargas Shares His Story


